- Have your immediate family pick a service project for a needy family within the community (paint, mend a fence, haul off trash, etc.) between Thanksgiving and Christmas. - On Christmas Eve, pile everyone into one car and drive around town and look at Christmas lights. On your return home, open all the main gifts for Christmas, youngest to oldest. Christmas morning the kids all wake up anxious to see what Santa has brought them!
- On Christmas Eve, dress up fancy (like for an awards show). Each sibling and parent draw a name from a hat for everyone involved. After a brief time of thought and preparation, go around the room and "award" the person you've drawn an acknowledgement pertaining to their unique personality.

As in the past, there are two different scholarship forms. Be sure when requesting a form that you specify either the "Graduating High School Student Application" or the "Returning College Application." Both forms are available from any FEC office or are available to download from www.fecnm.org.

This year, the FEC Board of Trustees has authorized (63) \$1,000 scholarships and (1) \$2,000 Glenn Holland Memorial scholarship.

The Farmers' Electric Education Foundation was established by the members of the cooperative in 1986 and is funded through donated and unclaimed patronage capital refunds and donations by private individuals.

Only the interest earned on donations is used for scholarships, ensuring that the Education Foundation will continue to support higher education for our members for many years to come. Through 2021, the foundation has awarded 1,383 scholarships totalling \$1,031,730.00.
