- Breakers trip or fuses blow when the switch is turned on.
- You detect an odor when a switch is used.
- The switch leans to one side or feels loose when operating.
- You experience a shock when operating the switch.
- The home is more than 40 years old and has aluminum wiring, but has not recently undergone a safety inspection by an electrician.

# **Practical Electric Vehicles Making Headway**

ave you noticed how many electric vehicles (EVs) are rolling around in our area lately? Okay, I admit, I haven't seen very many either. I do recall several of the Honda EV models in the distant past and even had the opportunity to take a ride in one from Clovis to Melrose to attend an evening Rotary meeting. I also recall in 1998, national recognition given Kris Trexler from California and his GM EV1, in his "Charge Across America," with preplanned stops in Santa Rosa and Tucumcari to recharge the batter-

ies. Early electric cars were generally only available by lease through the manufacturers and have largely disappeared from the roadways. It is interesting to note that electric cars were in the mix in the early days of the automobile, with improvements in the internal combustion engine, along with limitations in battery range killing the EV in all but limited applications by the "Roaring Twenties."

In recent years, rapid advances in battery technology have increased the range and reduced the cost of EVs. Coupled with

Federal tax incentives, currently \$7,500, and state or local incentives available in some areas, the cost of an EV is now on par with a similar gasoline powered unit. Just last year Chevrolet made history with the "Bolt," an all-electric car with a stated range of 238 miles on a full charge and a base cost of roughly \$39,000 before Federal Tax reduction and other incentives. Of course, the proof is "in the pudding," so they say. I am aware of two rural electric cooperatives which have purchased Bolts for use and evaluation, Otero County Electric Cooperative, Cloudcroft and CK Energy, Binger, Oklahoma. CK Energy has a "blog" detailing their good, bad, and ugly experiences with EV. Readers are encouraged to take a look at CK Energy's experiences at CK-Energy.coop, under the Energy Efficiency tab on their Home Page. One thing that sparked my interest is the comparative low cost of operation per mile when compared to gasoline.

Our wholesale power supplier, Western Farmers Electric Cooperative (WFEC), is currently working to take advantage of short-term state tax incentives in Oklahoma that support development of public EV charging infrastructure. In addition, WFEC is working with a coalition of entities in Oklahoma to develop a website dedicated to providing a resource for all things EV. We will provide more information about this website in future publications. Just for grins I logged on to their prototype website to check the availability of public charging stations across the 11,000 square-mile service territory of Farmers' Electric (FEC). I found two "Tesla" charging stations, one in Santa Rosa and one in Tucumcari and a Level 2 charging station located at the Blue Swallow Motel in Tucumcari. Currently, Tesla charging stations are only available for

## **Pole Testers in Area**

Ontinuing through the end of July or the beginning of August, weather permitting, GLS, Ground Line Services out of San Antonio, Texas, will be testing poles for Farmers' Electric Cooperative (FEC) out of the Weber City Substation. These areas would include, House, Fields, Forrest, Ragland, Quay Valley, Jordan, McAlister, and north of Taiban.

Pole testing is a yearly maintenance program that FEC performs, however, every pole is not tested each year, rather, FEC strives to test each on a ten-year rotation. This type of maintenance program helps to ensure that FEC can

continue to supply the very safest, reliable electrici-



ty to our members.

All FEC contractors should be marked as such, "FEC Contractor" on their vehicle. If you have any questions about pole testing or the pole testers, please feel free to contact the office at (800) 445-8541 and ask for Member Services.

Tesla cars. Major metropolitan areas have made significant investment in public charging infrastructure, with charging often available at no cost at the point of use to promote EV growth in their communities.

Major automobile manufacturers appear to believe the time is now for EV with most planning to introduce a variety of new models in the near future. Ford, GM, and Toyota alone plan to introduce some forty new EVs over the next seven years, including SUV, performance, and utility models. So, when do we expect EVs to be a common sight in our area? One of the primary concerns expressed by potential consumers is the lack of public charging infrastructure. Most industry insiders expect EV growth in rural areas to be slow, estimating less than one percent penetration by 2025. Even with the reduced cost and extended range, the limited availability of public charging infrastructure and the time required to charge, appear to relegate EVs to the local commuter car category for the foreseeable future.
